A Note from Your Pastor



Grace to you and peace from the Author, the Word, and the Translator. Amen.

This summer is a pivotal moment in the life of our Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. In 1988, our church was formed in the merger of three other church bodies: the American Lutheran Church, the Lutheran Church in America, and the

American Evangelical Lutheran Church. This was the culmination of over a century of mergers and consolidations of Lutheran church bodies across the country. Each of those predecessor church bodies brought different customs and traditions and we have been evolving together these last 37 years to live into our common mission as Lutherans together.

From July 28 – August 2, the ELCA Churchwide Assembly will meet in Phoenix (Good Shepherd's own Atif Dean is a voting member of the assembly!). The theme of this year's assembly is "for the life of the world," and the assembly will seriously consider how our church, the ELCA, is called to exist for the sake of others in today's world. We are the church when we exist for others, to paraphrase Bonhoeffer, and this year's assembly is happening at a pivotal moment in our nation and in our church.

The Churchwide Assembly will consider a Social Statement on Civic Life and Faith, deliberate over the report from the Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church and a report from the Barna Group on Strategic Recommendations for the ELCA, and elect council members. They will also elect a new presiding bishop for the ELCA, as the Rev. Elizabeth Eaton is retiring after two terms, and a Secretary of the ELCA as Deacon Sue Rothmeyer is retiring after one term.

As I said before, this is a pivotal moment for our church. After 37 years of letting the dust settle from the formation of the ELCA, it is time for us to really be clear about who we are for today and for tomorrow, not just to coast on who we were. This is local work to do in congregations for sure, but I believe we must do this work at a Churchwide level, and I pray that this assembly takes seriously the theme of "for the life of the world" and moves us forward as a church.

As the heat of summer moves through our region, as we go to the sea or the lake or the mountains, as we gather for ball games and picnics, may we keep this assembly in our heart and in our prayers. May the Holy Spirit blow through the assembly hall in Phoenix this summer and enliven our Church

for the facing of this hour. Amen.

Continue Joining us for ALT: Sundays Together! Next Gathering on September 21 at Good Shepherd

You're invited to participate in the Town of Colonie's food scraps drop off program. Every Saturday from 9 am-1 pm at the **Colonie Farmers Market at The** Crossings, they set up a green tent and food scraps drop off station. In addition to reducing waste, replenishing the nutrients in our soil (and food), and reducing greenhouse gas emissions, many people have found composting food scraps to be a loving spiritual practice that puts us more in touch with the God-given cycles of life, death and rebirth.

Give it a try and reap the material and spiritual benefits of this practice! To start, all it takes is a large jar, bucket or plastic container. It does not even need a lid. You can store the food scraps in your kitchen, fridge or freezer and bring them as often as every week to the Colonie Farmers Market (580 Albany Shaker Rd., Loudonville).

They DO accept:

Fruit and vegetable scraps, cake, bread, cookies, nuts & shells, coffee grounds, egg shells.

They DO NOT accept:

Meat, dairy, seafood or pet waste. No plastics, paper goods or plastic fruit labels! Just pure food scraps.

When you go out into the world, watch out for traffic, hold hands, stick together.
